This collaborative approach ensures all aspects of your child's growth are considered."

Host: "During the meeting, you'll review your child's current progress, discuss what strategies worked well, and identify areas needing adjustment. The team will also consider any additional support or services that might be necessary to help your child achieve their goals."

Host: "After the meeting, the updated IEP will be finalized and distributed to all team members who have a role in implementing the program. This document guides the educational support your child will receive. If new goals are set, teachers and support staff will start implementing the necessary changes by abiding by the start date on the updated IEP."

Host: "As a parent or guardian, your role is crucial. You're encouraged to share insights about your child's history, experiences and progress outside of school, ask questions, and advocate for their needs. Your input ensures the IEP is comprehensive and tailored to your child's unique situation."

Host: "If you have any questions, whether before, during, or after the meeting, reach out to your child's IEP team. They're there to support you and ensure you understand every aspect of your child's educational plan."
