Host: "Encourage your child's independence by involving them in decisions about their education when appropriate. Your child will feel more in control and have more buy-in if their opinion is part of their support plan. Teach them to express their needs and self-advocate, fostering confidence and empowerment in their learning journey."

Host: "If you choose, you can explore available outside resources such as tutoring, therapy services, and assistive technology to enhance your child's learning experience. Your child's



school, local community centers, or online platforms can be excellent sources of support and information."
